Hewitt, Tomic lead Australia from Davis Cup wilderness, in Poland

Lleyton Hewitt and Bernard Tomic have lead Australia to a long awaited return to the Davis Cup World Group top 16 for the first time since 2007.

After 3 successive play-off losses the 28 times Davis Cup champions have ended their six year hiatus and can now look forward to progressing further into the competition in February 2014.

Australia got off to a perfect start on day 1 singles, opening with a 3 set victory to Lleyton Hewitt against Lukasz Kubot 6/1 6/3 6/2 followed by Bernard Tomic defeating Michal Przysiezny 7/5 7/6(1) 6/4.

Day two doubles saw Captain Pat Rafter swing an interesting tactical change, resting Lleyton and substituting on debut Nick Kyrgios to team up with Chris Guccione and after a 5 set thriller were defeated by a formidable double combination of Mariusz Fyrstenberg and Marcin Matkowski 7/5 4/6 2/6 7/6(5) 4/6.

So it was off to bed on Saturday night with a 2/1 lead, one match from victory and that elusive World Group.

On Sunday Bernard Tomic came out firing and recorded his second singles victory for the tie when he defeated Lukasz Kubot 6/4 7/6(5) 6/3. After controlling the first set with his trade mark laid back performance Bernard surrendered momentum and was broken twice as Kubot lifted with his encouragement of home crowd support. Facing the prospect of dropping the second set Bernard then rallied to win 4 straight games to level at 5 all before winning a tight tiebreaker. The comeback by Bernard broke the Pole's spirit and Bernard closed the match comfortably to the joy of his teammates.

Nick Kyrgios again swung into action and was 4/1 up against Michal Przysiezny when the Pole retired with a stomach upset to give the Australians a 4/1 victory.

A touring party of around 30 Foundation members led by Ian Jane of Bentleigh Travel provided strong

The final of the Davis Cup between Serbia and Czech Republic will be held in Belgrade Serbia on the weekend 15-17 November 2013.

Nick Who?

- Lleyton Hewitt will return to Kooyong as the defending champion to fine tune his preparation for the Australian Open, committing to play in the new look AAMI Classic, an eight man special event now owned by sports giant IMG. The event will be held centre court at Kooyong 8-11 January 2014.
- Craig Tiley will remain Australia Open tournament director next January despite taking on the Chief Executive role at Tennis Australia. But the tennis calendar's opening grand slam is likely to have a new leader in 2015. The early resignation of Steve Wood as TA chief will have a ripple effect on the top executive roles for tennis administration.
- Nick Kyrgios has been hailed by Davis Cup Captain Pat Rafter as a star of the future after the teenager made a promising debut in Poland. He teamed with Chris Guccione in the high pressure team environment to fall in five sets to the doubles specialist duo of Marcin Matkowski and Mariusz Fyrstenberg.
- The Annual General meeting of the Foundation will be held at the Royal South Yarra Lawn Tennis Club at 8.00pm on Thursday 28 November 2013. An important piece of business to resolve is the proposed adoption of a new Constitution.
- Members should be aware of the interesting opportunity for travel in February to France for the first round of World Group Davis Cup match. As usual Bentleigh Travel will assist the Foundation by preparing an interesting itinerary and ticketing for the consideration of members. Time to check the expiry date on your Passport.

AUSTRALIA – Land of Tennis Opportunity

In no other country can a youngster take up tennis as easily as in Australia.

There are many more courts per head of population here than any other country and our climate is so mild that it is an all-the-year-round game. It is easy to understand the tremendous start Australia has in producing champions when such conditions are compared to those of most European countries.

For instance, the tennis season of countries like Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Russia and many another northern European countries is, at the most, six months long. For the other six months, play must be indoors. In these countries there are comparatively few outdoor courts and because of the high cost of building indoor courts, few players are able to afford the expense of playing during the winter.

In such countries it is a game for families of wealth, and a youngster without wealth must be very fortunate, firstly to be able to play, and secondly to attract attention if he has potential ability.

How different it is in Australia. Tennis is a game for those in all walks of life. There are courts in cities, towns and settlements and everywhere in private homes and private clubs. There are also public courts.

In addition, for those who cannot play in daylight hours, there are thousands of courts electrically lit for

night play. It is not an expensive game because club fees, especially for young people, are cheap. There is abundant opportunity for youngsters to show both their talent and potential ability, but this, of course, applies especially in the large cities and suburbs.

The AO Luncheon 2014


